TOWN BOARD ACTIONS

The August meeting was called to order at 7:00pm by Chairman Jeff Blix - 10 individuals joined the board in the Pledge of Allegiance. The treasurer was on his way, but not sure he would make the meeting. Minutes were approved with two corrections. The correspondence was reviewed and bills paid in the amount of \$47.637.24 Reports were made by the various department heads.

The clerk reported calls about storm clean up and if the township was planning on helping for have a drop off point for limbs/trees. Calls were returned with information on where they could haul debris and clean up was going as fast as we could. There was also a report of graffiti on a CenturyLink box. The clerk also apologized to Supervisor Cich for not getting him all of the documents he requested but she was still looking for them. The town hall was used as a staging and dinner station for the clean up crews. The clerk also stated we had received our first dividend check from our worker's comp insurance.

The treasurer phoned in his monthly reconciliation. Total funds available as of meeting night is approximately \$446,000, which included the \$80,000 in CD. the township holds. We have received our tax payment in the amount of 181,121.43.

The Road Foreman reported that there was major clean up after the storm with more work to still be accomplished as there is lots of overhanging branches in many areas. He also stated that most of the calls he got were going through at least one of the supervisors or clerk instead of calling him directly, so it wasn't timely notification. It was pointed out that all numbers for staff are listed on the front page of the newsletter. We had a beaver problem along Bear Island Road that was handled and seems to be under control. The question of mowing and brushing came up with this storm. The clerk reported she had gotten no quotes. With the storm we will put off the brushing till next year, Jeff will contact Ben Pearson and see if he is willing to do the mowing at least year's prices so we don't have to wait another month. The board thanked Lakehead Trucking, Jim Ray and Dale Cich for their help in the cleaning up efforts.

Fire Department - the department responded to 13—1 including a Carbon Monoxide alarm, 11 medical calls—4 which were mutual aid and included setting up a landing zone for a helicopter transport– and 1 fire call from a tree on a power line sparking. Many hours were spent assessing damage from the storms on July 5 and 21 to provide closed road information to the county's Emergency Management unit to help with damage assessment. Departments from Hoyt Lakes and Virginia came and helped clear roadways for emergency situations here prior to moving on to Lakewood Township. If

anyone is interested in joining the department, contact a member or stop at the fire hall any Thursday evening to find out more.

Law Enforcement—nothing Cemetery - Dirt was added to the area that had originally been earmarked for the memorial to even out the ground for the mower.

Parks & Rec - National Night Out was a hit and a big thank you from the board to the volunteers. It was asked what the situation is on the rocks and signs for the sledding hill. The signs have been ordered and it was suggested that if we plant some grass on the hill it may help filling in some of the ruts from vehicles using it. The sign for the park needed a final approval prior to installing.

Community Center - the sign out front is still in process.. The old fire hall has the new roof finished. It was asked if w could get a few more electrical outlets for outside. Greg Kaneski has someone he will contact for the board.

Recycling Center - the grant money was received and hopefully the security light will be installed soon.

Other Meetings - none

Under Old Business: - Fredenberg Lake Road - the new parcel listing was sent to the attorney, Much discussion still ensued on a fair and equitable way to assess the project. It is now on hold until next spring.

Website - the website has been pulled, all documents have been saved for a later date.

Under New Business: PEO Application - the clerk presented PEO's request received after last month's meeting. She was directed by the board as to the processing of the request.

Disaster Plan Recovery - this was added to the agenda from urgings of citizens making the calls about storm damage in the area. The board has no current plan to work on a plan but appreciate the concerns of the residents

With no further business, we adjourned at 8:00pm.

Rice Lake Area Farmers Market

Boyd Maranell, owner of Rice Lake Gardens (RLG), is realizing his vision of uniting several area farmers to offer a new locally-grown Farmer's Market to surrounding communities. Most favorably, these local farmers grow their produce *free of* pesticides and herbicides.



Maranell's gardening profes-

sion began on his family farm in Tyler, MN. He then went on to obtain his Horticulture AAS Degree at the University of MN and in 1979 started an award-winning landscaping business in the Twin Cities.

In 2012, Boyd founded RLG with aspirations of offering a locally-grown farmer's market to area residents. He deeply believes in local businesses and communities supporting each other.

Shortly after opening RLG, Boyd began working hand in hand with other area farmers to join his efforts in offering healthy bee-friendly produce. After four years of hard work, this collective undertaking has now blossomed into a new locally-grown farmer's market.

The fresh produce offered includes: Beans, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, chard, cucumbers, eggplant, kale, kohlrabi, leeks, onions, peas, peppers, potatoes, pumpkins, radishes, rutabagas, squash, tomatoes, turnips and more...

Fresh herbs including: Basil, cilantro, fennel, mint, lemon balm, lemon grass, marjoram, oregano, parsley, rosemary, sage, savory, tarragon, and thyme,

The Farmers Market will also include: Many Fall plants such as Mums, Ornamental Grasses, flowering cabbage and kale, and Autumn color containers; locally harvested Wild Rice, Maple Syrup, and Honey.

The Rice Lake Gardens Farmers Market is located at 5563 Rice Lake Rd. between Rice Lake Dam Rd and McComber Rd. Duluth.




