## **TOWN BOARD ACTIONS**

The February meeting was called to order at 7:0pm by Chairman Jeff Blix - 9 individuals joined the board in the Pledge of Allegiance. Minutes were approved with three typed corrections in the regular minutes and none in the Reorg and Budget/Salary meetings. The correspondence was reviewed and bills paid in the amount of \$31,265.30. Reports were made by the various department heads.

The clerk reported a busy month with various reports and certifications to file. She asked that everyone check their W-2s for the correct social so she can finish filing them. She reported that she has been working with the treasurer to complete the reconcile on the books. She spent a lot of time talking to several individuals, one from a neighboring township about township functions. We had 2 conceal and carry classes and will be hosting both the Democratic and Republican caucuses in March. She reminded the board of items needed to compile the Annual Report.

The treasurer was not present but had his monthly reconciliation report available. Total funds available as of 13 January are \$422,834.07, which included the \$80,000 in CD.s the township holds.

The Road Foreman patchy bad roads due mostly to the crazy weather and how the plows are getting out. There hasn't been enough snowfall to see if the spot on E. Birch Acres Rd.makes a difference

when he plows, but as he is driving a truck rather than a grader, the consensus is that it probably won't. The patch done on the Bear Island Road last fall is settling—probably due to frost heaving. A new process was used to fill it so we will see what happens when spring arrives. The speed limit sign on Bear Island Road also looked to be a victim of the snow plow.

Fire Department - had a busy January with 3 medical, 1 mutual aid medical, 2 fires and a mutual aid fire calls. Members attended training and the Arrowhead EMS Conference and Expo at the DECC. New gear lockers were purchased and installed as well as a new radiator for the rescue truck. The department prepared for their Insurance Services review.

Nothing from Law Enforcement or the Cemetery

Parks & Rec - the rink attendant has been doing a great job getting the rink ready.....and then the weather screws it all up. He has hours posted for when the skating shack and rink will be attended.

Community Center - the zone is still not heating correctly in the board room, but as long as we open the doors prior to meetings it will be fine.

Recycling Center - the attendants have decided against having a new window installed, so the clerk will submit the improvement grant for just the streetlight at the entrance.

**Other Meetings -** Supervisor Jeff Blix attended the Reservoir

Riders business meeting.

Under Old Business: - Ordinance - Mark Toms read just the revised sections of the ordinance. The board set a new Public Hearing for February 17 from 7-8pm in the basement.

**Shredding Day** - have made some initial phone calls, but have nothing definite at this time.

**Website** - the clerk has several resources for a new website, so she will begin work on that

Hall rental fees— the clerk apprised the board of surrounding townships prices. They will take it under advisement and item was tabled.

**Under New Business: Resolution** #16-001 Concerning the moral character of business owners with beer/liquor licensees - passed.

Request from Residents- the board has decided that a form will be created to streamline the process and to create a paper trail. The admin policy adopted already allows for charges tor information requests, but this will allow residents to give a written request to the board for information and a reply with the information back in a more timely manner.

Harassment - Belle Littler came to the board to let them know she had been ordered off the trail in recent weeks while walking her dog to allow dogsleds through. She also stated she had been contacted by law enforcement over some of the confrontations. She will be filing formal complaints and wanted the board to know of her actions and asked if they were prepared to back their intentions with regard to the park. Deb Pawlowicz asked if the rules and regulations for the park had been posted.

With no further business, we adjourned at 8:30pm



## SKIING IS GREAT AT BISKEY



The Democratic Party's donkey and the Republican Party's elephant have been on the political scene since the 19th century. The origins of the Democratic donkey can be traced to the 1828 presidential campaign of Andrew Jackson. During that race, opponents of Jackson called him a jackass. However, rather than rejecting the label, Jackson, a hero of the War of 1812 who later served in the U.S. House of Representatives and U.S. Senate, was amused by it and included an image of the animal in his campaign posters. Jackson went on to defeat incumbent John Quincy Adams and serve as America's first Democratic president. In the 1870s, influential political cartoonist Thomas Nast helped popularize the donkey as a symbol for the entire Democratic Party.

The Republican Party was formed in 1854 and six years later Abraham Lincoln became its first member elected to the White House. An image of an elephant was featured as a Republican symbol in at least one political cartoon and a newspaper illustration during the Civil War (when "seeing the elephant" was an expression used by soldiers to mean experiencing combat), but the pachyderm didn't start to take hold as a GOP symbol until Thomas Nast, who's considered the father of the modern political cartoon, used it in an 1874 Harper's Weekly cartoon. Titled "The Third-Term Panic," Nast's drawing mocked the New York Herald, which had been critical of President Ulysses Grant's rumored bid for a third term, and portrayed various interest groups as animals, including an elephant labeled "the Republican vote," which was shown standing at the edge of a pit. Nast employed the elephant to represent Republicans in additional cartoons during the 1870s, and by 1880 other cartoonists were using the creature to symbolize the party.

Along with the donkey and elephant, the German-born Nast is associated with another political animal, the ferocious Tammany Tiger, which the crusading artist famously featured in an 1871 Harper's Weekly cartoon that attacked New York's William "Boss" Tweed and Tammany Hall, his corrupt political machine. Not all of Nast's work was about politics, though; he's also credited with creating the modern image of Santa Claus.
