### **NOVEMBER 10, 2020 TOWN BOARD ACTIONS**

The monthly meeting was CALLED TO ORDER at 7 pm by Chair Clay Cich. Also, present were: Deb Pawlowicz, Walter Rapp, Jim Ray, Tim Wagner. Mary Skafte & Diane Palmstein/clerks present, Pam Blekestad, Treasurer also present. 19 individuals were present and stood with the Board to recite the Pledge of the Allegiance. APPROVAL OF MINUTES: Oct.7, 2020 meeting minutes reviewed by the Board, Walter made motion to accept with 1 correction, under CARES change foggers to fogger, Jim Ray seconded. 5 YEAS. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. Oct. 21, 2020 meeting minutes were reviewed by the Board, Deb Pawlowicz made a motion to accept without corrections, Clay Cich seconded. 5 YEAS. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. TREASURER'S REPORT: as of Oct. 13, 2020, reconciled checking account balance is \$332,375.97. Total funds available \$535,293.48, which includes 4 CDs totaling \$202,917.51. Clay Cich made a motion to accept Treasury report, Walter Rapp seconded. 5 YEAS. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. CORRESPONDENCE: 23 total: 2 mail and 21 e-mails were received and reviewed by the Board. Deb Pawlowicz requested that the variance notices be forwarded to the Board when they arrive. REVIEW OF BILLS: Mary Skafte/clerk informed supervisors that checks to Vesel Construction, MN Locksmith and Air Circulation are 2 separate checks, one for a down payment, which will be sent out now and one the final payment which will be sent when the work is complete. This is done to comply with CARES FUNDING requirements to submit payments by Nov. 15. Also check #10203 is amount returned to St. Louis County to use from our CARES distribution that was unused (total of \$1796.65). No corrections. Jim Ray made motion to accept check #10159 to 10203, totaling \$62,262.35, Deb Pawlowicz seconded. 5 YEAS. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. REPORTS: Clerk - Mary Skafte & Diane Palmstein/clerks read an email received through the Fredenberg Townhall office from Clay Cich regarding mail received through the office, stating Diane Palmstein was discarding documents in the trash can in the office in his presence, the clerks felt the Board should be made aware of the accusation, the clerks wanted to emphatically deny discarding documents or withholding documents from the Board. Clerks requested that more outlets be put in the office area, Jim Ray will check into this. Clerks were very busy with elections and very grateful for all the hard work by the election judges. Road Report – Wood Duck Lane/NW Island Lake Road intersection had Century Link pedestal moved and the curve work was completed by Lakehead Trucking. Will continue to do grading as needed. Fire Department- responded to 6 calls: 2 medical calls, a tree on a power line, an equipment problem in a structure & 2 mutual aid calls (1 in Gnesen: cancelled & 1 in Rice Lake, commercial garage fire). Fire Department members would like to congratulate Glen Bergstrand on his 50th anniversary of serving the community through the department. Glen joined the dept. on Nov. 12, 1970. Glen has served in many positions on the department, including 10 years as the Fire Chief. Thank-you Glen for your dedication & service to the Fredenberg Fire Department, residents & visitors of Fredenberg and beyond. The Fredenberg Fire Dept. has a few openings for new members. Please contact any current member to find out more or stop by the fire hall when you see vehicles in the parking lot. You may also email at Fredenbergfd@aol.com. Our expenses this year have been high because of the COVID pandemic. We have had to purchase much more personnel protective equipment than we normally do. We also need to purchase additional equipment to

replace some we currently have. Because of COVID we need to purchase more face masks for the SCBA's, but because of the age of the SCBA's, we are unable to purchase just the masks as they are no longer available. We will need to purchase some new SCBA's so we can properly outfit our firefighters. The items are not eligible items for the Assistance to Firefighters COVID grant that we are applying for. Information to go into the newsletter on kitchen safety during the holiday. Cemetery – Walter Rapp reported there was an issue with a recent burial grave site, and he added/smoothed out topsoil. The cemetery is now closed. Parks & Rec - Rink lights will be installed this week and outside lights added to the Community Center. Lights at the Recycle Center are complete. Community Center-Work has begun on air to air exchangers in the lower level today. There has been a leak in the Community Center roof from around the vents when snow melts, Jim Ray placed deicing cable there but the contractor for the air exchanger will look at it and give a recommendation. Recycle Center – Problems with residents putting clam shells in dumpsters, Deb Pawlowicz will put up more signage to inform patrons. LED lighting and garages doors (installed by Jim Ray & Walter Rapp) are complete. Other Meetings - None. OPEN FORUM: Mary Skafte/resident requested clarification on unsigned letters/anonymous letters to the Township. Walter Rapp made a motion to not accept unsigned/anonymous letters addressed to the Board, Tim Wagner seconded. 2 YEAS 3 NAYS. MOTION FAILED. Deb Roach/resident stated she knew Carlton County accepted unsigned letters. Patty Wheeler/resident also stated in her work with St. Louis County that the courts accepted unsigned/anonymous letters. She congratulated Walter Rapp and Deb Pawlowicz on their re-election. Asked that the public be more civil at meetings and on Nextdoorfredenberg. OLD BUSINESS: East Cook Lake Road Paving and Bollig Feasibility Study: Nathan Feist/Bollig Engineering presented the Feasibility Study and outline for the Road Improvement Project. Construction costs are estimated to be \$416,600.00 with 43 parcels assessed, approximately \$9,700.00/parcel. Jim Ray made a motion to a motion to hold a Public Hearing on Tuesday, December 8<sup>th</sup> at 7:00pm in the Fredenberg Town Hall, Deb Pawlowicz seconded. 5 YEAS. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. The Board did not approve Bollig Engineering to complete a survey of the road and would address at a later meeting. Township Moratorium on Gravel Pits & ARDC Study: Justin Otsea/ARDC present and requested direction from the Board on what ARDC would be directed to do to formulate a plan for zoning and a zoning board. Board members discussed clarifying roles for ARDC & Kennedy/Graven Law Firm and decided the township would contact ARDC if any further assistance was needed. NEW BUSINESS: Update on Nov. 3, 2020 General Election: clerks reported that 693 voted in person, approximately 355 voters were by absentee ballot. Election Judges were amazing, and everything ran smoothly, and voters had no issues complying with COVID restrictions. Gravel Pit Ordinance Study Committee Formation: The Board reviewed packet from Kennedy/Graven. Deb Pawlowicz made a motion to initiate a Study Committee for the Extractive Use Ordinance, not to be limited in number of members, Jim Ray seconded. 3 YEAS 2 NAYS. MOTION PASSED. Jim Ray made a motion to accept the application for Study Committee members with corrections and advertise in the newsletter, Deb Pawlowicz seconded. 3 YEAS 2 NAYS. MOTION PASSED. Deadline to submit application for the committee will be on Tuesday, Dec. 1, 2020. Residents can get an application by calling the Town Hall office or email Fredenbergtwp@gmail.com. Second Meeting of the Board on Wednesday, November 18, 2020: Jim Ray made a motion to cancel the Wednesday, November 18, 2020 Town Board Meeting at 7:00pm, Walter Rapp seconded. 5 YEAS. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. OTHER MEETINGS: Fredenberg Board of Canvass (to certify election results) in the Fredenberg Town Hall at 7:00pm on Thursday, November 12, 2020. ADJOURNMENT: Člay Cich made a motion to adjourn meeting, Walter Rapp seconded. MOTION PASSED UNANIMOUSLY. Meeting adjourned at 9:25 pm.

### TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Supervisors of Fredenberg Township will hold a Public Hearing on Tuesday, December 8, 2020 at 7:00 pm at the Fredenberg Town Hall/Community Center, 5104 Fish Lake Road, Duluth, MN 55803 to consider the ordering of the proposed improvement to East Cook Lake Road in Fredenberg Township, including bituminous surfacing, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 429.011 to 429.111. The estimated cost of the improvement is Four Hundred Sixteen Thousand and Six Hundred and 00/100 dollars (\$416.600.00). A reasonable estimate of the impact of the assessment will be available at the hearing. ### Cooking safety from the Fire Department

Most house fires are caused by cooking. It is the greatest cause of home fires and home fire injuries. It isn't surprising that Thanksgiving is the peak day for home cooking fires. Share these cooking tips with your community during November. While they plan their menus, they can also plan for fire safety.

Stay in the kitchen when you are cooking at high temperatures. Stay home when cooking your turkey and check on it frequently. If you leave the kitchen, set a timer to remind you there is food simmering or baking. Keep children and pets away from the stove. They need to stay at least three feet away. Wear short or close-fitting sleeves while cooking on the stove. Keep pan/pot handles turned towards the back of the stove. Many people like to fry their turkeys. There are several risks you should consider if you use a turkey fryer: Turkey fryers can easily tip over spilling hot oil across a large area. An overfilled cooking pot will cause oil to spill over when the turkey is placed inside. You can test the level of oil needed by filling the pot with water first and dipping the turkey inside to see how much the water rises. A partially frozen turkey will cause hot oil to splatter. Turkey fryers can easily overheat and start a fire. Even a small amount of cooking oil spilling on a hot burner can cause a large fire. Without thermostat controls, deep fryers can overheat oil to the point of starting a fire. The pot, lid and handles of a turkey fryer can get dangerously hot and cause burn injuries. Consider using an electric turkey fryer. They take some of the risks out of cooking. But if you do deep-fry a turkey: Place the fryer outside, on a flat surface that can't burn, such as cement. Place the fryer at least 10 feet from anything that can catch fire. This includes anything overheard like your house eaves or branches. Keep children and pets at least three feet from the fryer. Use a fryer with thermostat controls. Without these, the oil can heat to the point of catching fire. Thaw the turkey completely before cooking it so ice crystals won't splatter the hot oil. Use potholders and oven mitts when handling the turkey.

There's nothing more satisfying than cooking a good meal for the people we love. Make safety a priority in your kitchen, at Thanksgiving, and all year long.

### NOXIOUS WEED: BUCKTHORN

Fall is the best time of year to control the noxious invasive weed, Buckthorn. Buckthorn was formerly planted as a hedge, but now we know how destructive it is, and it is illegal to sell it.

It forms dense thickets, and crowds out native plants, pushing out the shrubs and small trees that birds normally use for nesting. It degrades wildlife habitat, contributes to erosion, and serves as a host to other pests. There are no natural controls like insects to curb its growth.

It can grow to 20 feet, has bark similar to native plum or cherry, and has glossy leaves that stay green late into the fall.

If you just have a few buckthorns on your property, it is fairly easy to control, and fall is the time to do it. Buckthorn holds its leaves later than most natives so it is easy to see. You can pull small plants by hand. Plants with thicker stems are best controlled by cutting the stem at the soil surface and then covering or treating the stump to prevent re-sprouting. Herbicides such as Roundup will kill actively growing plants.

- 5. We NO LONGER repurpose any form of electronics, these must be brought to the Rice Lake Road WLSSD Center.
- 6. Dumping of garbage of any kind at the Center is ILLEGAL.
- 7. We DO NOT ACCEPT take out containers, fruit/veg. plastic containers & deli clam containers.

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
